Healthy Start continues to work diligently to reduce the number of babies who die before celebrating their first birthday, a tragedy that no family should have to experience. Despite the challenges presented by COVID and natural disasters, our home visiting staff were able to continue serving their families through education, wraparound services, and linkage to community resources. Prenatal providers experienced their own unique set of challenges, which unfortunately affected the number of pregnant women completing the prenatal screening form who were then not able to be referred for services. Our major fundraiser held in May, the Celebration of Motherhood, was held inperson for the first time since the pandemic. We reestablished programs including the T.E.A.M. Dad fatherhood program, and the Fetal Infant Mortality Review. Various community-based initiatives also took shape, such as partnering with the Florida Perinatal Quality Collaborative to implement a quality improvement initiative assisting hospitals in addressing a myriad of factors that influence maternal health behaviors and outcomes. This past year of challenges and change has taught us that our organization is in a period of transition, but poised for success. We will continue to prioritize maternal and child health and focus on reducing preterm birth, low birth weight and infant mortality. As we enter this next year, we rely on the support from our many funders, sponsors and community partners but especially from our wonderful Healthy Start staff. Together we will give every baby a Healthy Start!





Our Dollars at Work

Maintaining exemplary fiscal accountability of the state and federal funds the Coalition receives has been a hallmark of our work since we were founded in 1992. Over 80 percent of the Coalition's total FY22/23 expenditures of \$3.87 million dollars went directly for Healthy Start program services for pregnant women and infants. In addition to funding these services, the Coalition leveraged \$1,537,591 in cash and in-kind contributions, including being funded in part by Orange County, Florida and the West Orange Health District. Our annual signature fundraising event, Celebration of Motherhood, along with other fundraising and grant proposal efforts, help us close the gap on the unmet needs of the families we serve. The contract amount spent and clients served in each program follows.
